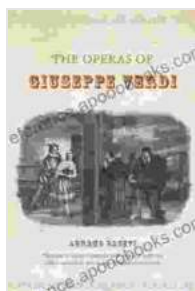

Rigoletto (1851)

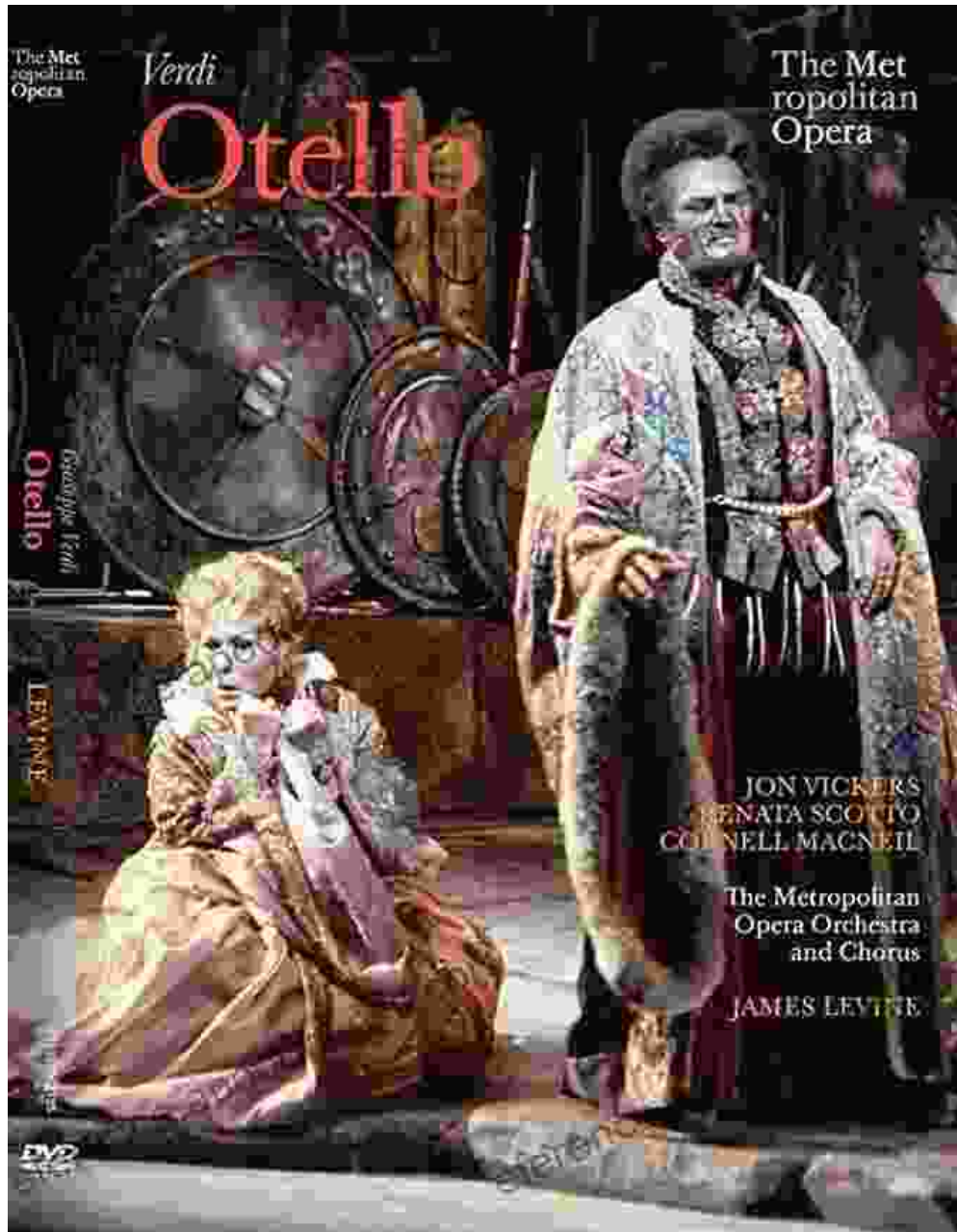


Rigoletto is a haunting tale of a father's love and the consequences of a cruel curse.

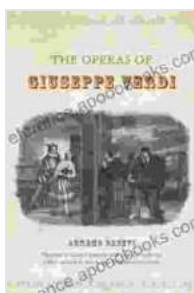
wit, and memorable melodies, including the rousing "Va, vecchio John" (Go, old John).

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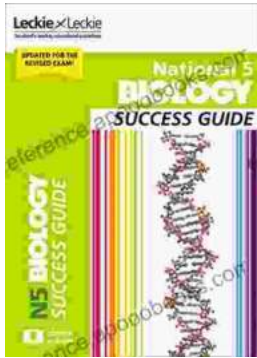
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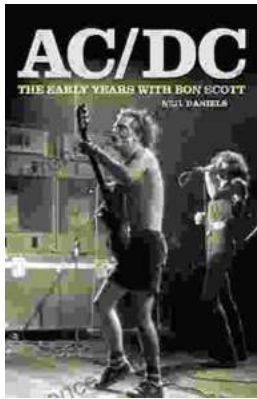
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
